Preliminary Report – September 29, 2007

Introduction to Survey

During the past year, the Archives Association of British Columbia has undergone a strategic planning process. Throughout the spring of 2007 the Strategic Planning Committee (made up largely of past presidents), the Executive, committee chairs and regional representatives worked with consultant Rick Knowlan to create a strategic plan.

The plan included a review of our business environment, identification of our customers, the establishment of core strategies and concrete plans to achieve those strategies. One of the activities identified for 2007 was a membership needs survey, to assist the Executive in planning programmes and services for 2008, including identifying provincial priorities for National Archival Development Programme funding, which is provided to our association by Library and Archives Canada via the Canadian Council of Archives.

A survey was sent out to 337 members of which 66 provided usable responses for an overall return rate of 20%. The results of the survey are divided into two sections. The first section presents the findings for institutional members and the other one for individual members.

In both sections, the main findings of the survey results are presented in statistical tables compiled for the raw data that was collected. Each of the tables report findings in percentages computed from the total number of usable responses received in each category. In accordance with standardized practices for the presentation of numerical data, all percentages with decimal fractions have been rounded off to whole numbers.

1.4.1 Recommendations for Changes to BC Archival Education & Advisory Service by Institutional Members

- Hire a new coordinator to replace Jen if you haven't already done so.
- We do not benefit directly from Advisory Services but we do benefit from workshops. Changes: (1) Obtain more funding so there can be more workshops, site visits and on AABC Directorate; (2) greater emphasis on provincial community-building; (3) mentoring program for institutions and individuals. (4) Day long workshop sessions in conjunction with conference.
- Fund more workshops (e.g., hands-on demo of digital repository software) at AABC conference and fund more travel costs connected to attending them.
- I like the online courses. Thanks. We need more of them if possible. And if possible could there be some kind of certification. That could be a can of worms but for those of us out in the trenches with no hope of being able to go back to school or even having an on-line Archival Course anywhere in the country, (that I could find at least and at a reasonable charge) it would be nice to have something.

- Provide workshops on electronic records management.
- Greater frequency and variety of educational seminars - more advanced level of instruction for some sessions
- -Support for advocacy work in non-member institutions - this is particularly necessary for communities that are anxious to develop archives but are not aware of the AABC. Furthermore, AABC requirements are often a deterrent to obtaining Institutional Membership, both in terms of cost and in the amount of knowledge and outside support that is necessary to develop the application and meet the requirements. More could be done by the AABC either in direct support or in assistance to member institutions in supporting the education and advancement of archivists in non-member archival institutions, particularly those representing marginalized communities. This concern is applicable particularly to First Nations communities, but also to a range of non-profit organizations without budgets or guaranteed ongoing institutional support (because of the nature of funding), who do not therefore meet the requirements of institutional membership.

1.4.2. Recommendations for Changes to BC Archival Preservation Service by Institutional Members

- Consortium for cold storage, preservation management, treatment, centre of excellence. (2) Greater emphasis on preservation standards, especially recognized reformatting standards information.
- Courses on digital preservation
- Support for advocacy work in non-member institutions - this is particularly necessary for communities that are anxious to develop archives but are not aware of the AABC. Preservation Service could be available to a broader range of archives and institutions, with the support of member organizations who bear some of the cost of this outreach, either financially or in time commitments.
- again on going advice on care and storage requirements etc

1.4.3. Recommendations for Changes to BC Archival Network Service by Institutional Members

- Continue to emphasize/develop linkages between BCAUL fonds descriptions, lower level descriptions, electronic finding aids and digitized images etc. to ensure context is presented and preserved. (2) Develop strategy to improve descriptions throughout BC to achieve (1).
- Very Important to keep this current and active. It is a key research tool.
- Have a yearly or once every two year meeting with a member of institutional members as a networking process.

2.4.1. Recommendations for Changes to BC Archival Education & Advisory Service

- Would like to see a broader selection of workshops & courses (e.g., image archives, preservation, database).offer More advanced/specialized training opportunities to those who have completed Master's programs who do not benefit from introductory post-appointment training, ie digital preservation; ensure conference sessions are useful for professional archivists and not all geared to volunteers/small institutions (I know that this doesn't really fit here, however, there was no area to comment on conferences)
- Focus more on the educational needs of professionally trained archivists
- Develop an Advanced Continuing Education Program (1-2 courses a year) for archivists and other records professionals who possess substantial graduate education and/or experience. If once a year, this could be a pre-conference workshop.
